What is the IEC Working Holiday Program?

The International Experience Canada (IEC) Working Holiday program provides temporary work permits to eligible youth from 36 participating countries. If you're between the ages of 18-30 or 18-35 (depending on the country) and you're a citizen of one of the countries listed here, you may be eligible!

The IEC Working Holiday program is one of the most popular work permit programs in Canada. The application process is relatively simple and each year tens of thousands of youths from around the work travel to Canada to live, work, and play.

If you're successful through the IEC Working Holiday program, you receive an open work permit. This allows you to work for almost any employer in Canada, plus you're free to move around and change jobs as you'd like.

To help you better understand the process, we created this IEC Working Holiday immigration guide.


How to use this guide

To guide you on your journey, we've broken your tasks into different stages corresponding to the steps in your immigration process. If you're at the beginning of your immigration process, you can read through this guide from the beginning. However, if you've already started your immigration, feel free to skip ahead to the tasks corresponding to your current stage.

Getting Started

Getting Started

In the first stage, you need to check your eligibility for the IEC Working Holiday program and submit a profile to the IEC pools so that you can be considered for a work permit.



TASK 01.A

Find out if you're eligible to apply through the IEC Working Holiday program

Let's find out if you're eligible to apply to the IEC Working Holiday program. This program is designed for youth aged 18-30 or 18-35 from participating countries. If successful, you will receive an open work permit allowing you to work and travel freely in Canada for a period between one and three years (depending on the country).

There are a few ways to check your eligibility for the IEC Working Holiday program. First, you can look at the list of participating countries to see if your country and age range are on the list. For a more formal assessment, we recommend using IRCC's Come to Canada Tool:

Here are the steps:

- 1. Visit the Come to Canada tool, linked here.
- 2. For the question 'What would you like to do in Canada?' select the option 'IEC Travel and Work'
- 3. For the question 'How long are you planning to stay in Canada?' select the option 'Temporarily - more than 6 months'
- 4. After answering all remaining questions, take note of the result. If it says 'You may be eligible to come to Canada under International Experience Canada' BINGO! Take note of the personal reference code you receive at the end of the questionnaire, as you'll need it for the next steps in your journey to Canada (if you already have an IRCC account, you can complete this questionnaire directly from your account and won't need a reference code).

TASK 01.A - CONT.

Find out if you're eligible to apply through the IEC Working Holiday program

Not eligible? Don't worry, we can still help!

If the Come to Canada tool returns a result stating 'it seems you are not eligible to come to Canada through International Experience Canada,' you can return to the questionnaire again to find out if you may be eligible for another immigration pathway (consider selecting 'Move there', 'Work', or 'Study' for the question 'What would you like to do in Canada?).

Canada offers a wide range of immigration programs, and we hope you may be eligible for at least one of them. We at Moving2Canada are currently working hard to serve personalized checklists to more people across other immigration programs in the future.

TASK 01.B

Check the residency & discontinuance requirements for your country

People from certain IEC-eligible countries should be aware of two potentially important requirements: the residence requirement, and the discontinuance requirement.

While most IEC candidates may apply for their IEC work permit while residing (living) anywhere, candidates from a select few countries need to be residing in their home country when applying. This is known as the residence requirement, and it's important to check if this requirement applies to you.

Also, candidates from some IEC countries may have to consider what is known as the discontinuance requirement. Discontinuance means that if you have recently held an IEC work permit or currently hold one, and you're now pursuing another IEC work permit, you may need to have a gap between these two works permits. If your country has a discontinuance requirement, note that it only applies between one IEC participation and the next IEC participation. If you have finished an IEC participation and then apply for a work permit in another (non-IEC) category, the discontinuation requirement doesn't apply.

So, here are the steps to check if either or both requirements apply to people from your country:

Visit this IRCC page.

Scroll to the 'View list by country or territory' drop-down menu near the bottom of that page and select your country from the list. Take note of the discontinuance requirement and residence requirements for your country and category.

TASK 01.B - CONT.

Check the residency & discontinuance requirements for your country

If the requirements for your IEC category states 'No specific requirement' for both discontinuance and residence — simply complete this checklist task and continue along your journey.

But, if there is a discontinuance requirement AND you have previously participated in the IEC program (potentially in another category to the one you are now pursuing), take note of the time period that must be completed between the two IEC work permits. Even if you are pursuing your first IEC work permit, it's worth making a mental note of the discontinuance requirement in case you want to participate again in the future.

Also, if there is a residence requirement requiring you to be a resident of your home country at the time of application AND you are not currently resident in your home country, you may have to consider moving home temporarily before applying to move to Canada through IEC.

TASK 01.C

Ensure your passport has sufficient remaining validity

Your passport must be valid:

- \cdot when you apply to the International Experience Canada (IEC) program; and
- when you enter and depart from Canada.

Your work permit will not be issued for longer than the validity of your passport. Your passport must include a blank page other than the last page.

The IEC Working Holiday program is one of the most efficient means of obtaining a temporary work permit that allows you to work and travel in Canada. However, you may also want to consider other options.

For example, IEC also offers two other streams, the Young Professionals program (if you already have a job lined up) and the International Co-op program (for university students completing internships in Canada).

Create & submit your IEC profile

If you want to be invited to apply for the IEC Working Holiday program, first you have to enter the pool. To do this, you need to create & submit a profile on the website for Canada's immigration department, called Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC).

There are a few ways to check your eligibility for the IEC Working Holiday program. First, you can look at the list of participating countries to see if your country and age range are on the list. For a more formal assessment, we recommend using IRCC's Come to Canada Tool:

Follow these steps:

- 1. Create or check your IRCC account: Creating an account with IRCC is a necessary step in the IEC process. Get started here.
- 2. Create your IEC Profile: Make sure you've got your passport handy for this. You'll also need to provide information about your identity and your contact information. Create your IEC profile here.
- 3. Submit your profile to the pools: Once you submit your profile to the pool, that you will automatically be entered into the streams you qualify for.

Once you complete this task, you're ready to move onto Stage #2: In the IEC Pool.



Now that you've submitted your profile to the IEC pools, you have to wait to receive your invitation. Depending on how many people are in the pools and the quotas for your country, this could happen within a few days, a few months, or might require waiting and submitting a profile again in future years.

If you want to stay up to date on the latest IEC invitations, follow our IEC News Hub where we post weekly updates throughout the IEC season. While you wait to receive your invitation, you can begin working on a few tasks.

TASK 02.A

Find out which documents are required for your work permit application

Before you can have an adventure in Canada, you'll need to gather some key documents. Different documents are required at different stages of the application process. For example, in 'Stage #3 – After Receiving an Invitation' you'll need to submit a few documents with your application, like police certificates, a copy of your passport, your CV, and more.

If you're successful and move on to 'Stage #4 – After Receiving a POE Letter' you'll need a few more documents for travelling to Canada and activating your work permit. This includes things like proof of financial support (i.e. showing you have at least CAD \$2,500 in finances) and proof of health insurance for the duration of your work permit.

The exact document requirements vary from applicant to applicant, so it's important to be attentive to the forms and requests you receive at each step.

TASK 02.B

Begin preparing for the Canadian jobs market (optional)

It's never too early to start preparing to find a job. Although you're still early in the IEC Working Holiday process, this is a great time to optimize your resume (also called a CV) for Canadian jobs.

The format for a resume (might be different in Canada than in your country. To start building a winning resume that will land you interviews with employers in Canada, download your free Canadian resume template.

It's crucial to communicate your skills and experience in the best possible manner to give your job search a solid platform. Your resume is one of the first impressions you make with a prospective employer, and a strong Canada-style resume will win you interviews and increase your value.

On a Canadian resume, you do not need to include a photo, marital status, religion, or any personal information beyond contact info and relevant experience. This is just one piece of advice — you'll find more expert tips in the resources linked below.

TASK 02.C Obtain police certificate(s)

Police certificates are a mandatory requirement for your application. If you fail to submit a required police certificate (or proof that you applied for your police certificate) then your application will be rejected. Lucky for you, we've put together <u>this guide on getting police</u> <u>certificates for IEC.</u>

Why plan early?

Getting your police certificate can take a while, depending on the country, or countries, you need to get a certificate from. If you wait until you have been invited to apply in order to apply for your police certificate(s), you risk missing important deadlines and potentially missing the opportunity to live and work in Canada. You can avoid all that stress by simply planning early and applying for your police certificate(s) in advance of being invited to apply. There is no risk in planning this task early, and plenty of reward!

If the certificate is for the country where you're currently living, it must have been issued within the past six months. If it's for any other country, then it must have been issued after the date that you last lived in the country for six consecutive months.

TASK 02.D

Complete a medical exam (if necessary)

If you're planning to work in a certain field, or if you've spent time in certain countries, you may need to complete a medical exam as part of your Canadian immigration process. You should submit these results with your work permit application to avoid any potential issues.

Examples of such jobs may include:

- workers in the health sciences field,
- · clinical laboratory workers,
- patient attendants in nursing and geriatric homes,
- · medical students admitted to Canada to attend university,
- medical electives and physicians on short-term locums,
- teachers of primary or secondary schools, or other teachers of small children,
- domestics,
- workers who give in-home care to children, the elderly and the disabled,
- day nursery employees, and
- other similar jobs.

If you have lived or travelled for six months or more in any of <u>these listed countries</u> or territories in the year before you come to Canada, you must have a medical exam.

TASK 02.E Receive & accept your invitation to apply

If you are invited from the pool, IRCC will notify you through your account. Once you receive your ITA, you will have 10 days to accept it and start your application or decline the invitation. After the invitation has been accepted, you will then need to apply for a work permit by submitting completed forms, documents (such as police certificates) and payment within 20 days.

Once you submit your invitation, you can move onto Stage #3 – After Receiving an Invitation to Apply! Be careful, in the next stage there are time-sensitive deadlines, so be sure to complete all the steps in the provided time.

If you decline an invitation, you'll stay in the IEC pool of candidates (as long as you are still eligible) to be considered in future rounds of invitations.

If you choose to decline an invitation, it will not have a negative effect on future invitations.

To decline the invitation:

- go to the section called "Continue my profile / application, not yet submitted" in your IRCC account,
- $\cdot\,$ find the application called "Work permit", and
- click "Decline application".

If you do not respond to an invitation, the invitation will expire by the deadline shown in the invitation. If it expires, you'll have to submit a new IEC profile and be accepted into the pool again before you can be considered for future invitations.

After receiving an invitation

Congratulations! Receiving an invitation to apply is a huge milestone in the IEC process. From the moment you clicked 'Accept' on your Invitation to Apply, you have 20 days to submit a complete application that meets the eligibility requirements for IEC. If your application is complete and meets the eligibility requirements for IEC, then you should receive your Port of Entry Letter (POE Letter) which allows to you travel to Canada and obtain your work permit.

It's important to be meticulous with your application and to ensure that you submit everything within the required timeframe. Immigration officials are very strict in evaluating applications and a refusal could require you to start again from the beginning.

The tasks in this stage will help guide you. Here are the tasks in Stage #3:

TASK 03.A Begin saving at least \$2,500 CAD

You do not need to show this money when you submit your work permit application. However, you will need to show it when you travel to Canada to activate your work permit. We include this task at this stage to give you a heads up about this upcoming requirement, so you have time to save the required funds.

The Canadian government wants to ensure that any person participating in the IEC Working Holiday program has the financial resources needed to support their basic needs upon arrival. You must have your proof of financial support when you travel to Canada, as the immigration officer who completes your landing will likely request it. A statement of your bank account issued no more than one week prior to your departure for Canada will suffice.

TASK 03.B

Get documents translated (if not in English or French)

All documents must be submitted in either English or French. If your document is in another language, then you also must submit an official translation from a certified translator.

TASK 03.C

Upload documents, submit your IEC work permit application, and pay fees

Give yourself some time for this step. Uploading your documents to IRCC sometimes causes trouble due to restrictions on file size and file format. For help uploading your documents, check out this video guide:

TASK 03.D Submit biometrics (or confirm an exemption)

You'll receive a request to complete biometrics (fingerprints and photo) after you've submitted your work permit application. You'll have 30 days to complete your biometrics and upload the receipt.

TASK 03.E Provide additional documents, if requested

TASK 03.G

Receive your Port of Entry Letter of Introduction (POE Letter)

Congratulations! This letter shows that your work permit application has been approved. 'Port of Entry' refers to the place where you enter Canada (like an airport or a land crossing). You'll give this Letter of Introduction to the border agent at the Port of Entry when you enter Canada.

Once you complete this task, you can move onto Stage #4 – After Receiving a POE Letter!

Hoorah! With your Port of Entry Letter of Introduction (POE Letter), you can now travel to Canada, activate your work permit, and begin your IEC adventure. This is a huge step. It's possible you might have already arranged accommodations before coming to Canada. However, we often recommend finding a temporary place to stay upon arrival. This will give you the time and freedom to explore a longer-term living situation in-person. It's always easier to hunt for a place to live — and <u>avoid rental scams</u> — when you're able to visit the location!

Booking self-catering accommodation — perhaps for a few weeks, or even a month or two — is a practical way to get to know your destination city before committing to a neighbourhood. The major player in this market is Airbnb, but there are also temporary apartment rental companies that provide excellent temporary accommodation for newcomers to Canada.

Take out an eligible health insurance policy

Purchasing the right health insurance is a mandatory requirement for IEC participants.

Getting appropriate IEC health insurance is a crucial step in your pre-arrival journey, but knowing exactly what type of insurance you need and what your options are can be a headache. Our <u>IEC</u> <u>Health Insurance guide</u> will help you understand exactly what IEC health insurance is, and which providers can cover you so you can get on with the fun stuff — living and working in Canada!

For International Experience Canada, you must have health insurance for the entire time you are in Canada. The health insurance must cover medical care, hospitalization, and repatriation.

You may be refused entry if you don't have insurance. If your insurance policy is valid for less time than your expected stay in Canada, you will be issued a work permit that expires at the same time as your insurance. For example, if you're eligible for a 2-year work permit, but your insurance is only valid for 1 year, then you will only be issued a 1-year work permit. If this happens, you will not be able to apply to extend your work permit later.

TASK 04.F

Obtain important non-immigration documents (driving record, tax forms, etc.)

Before you leave for Canada, it's a good idea to gather important documents you might require while in another country. It can be tricky to obtain these documents once you're away, so doing this now can save you some hassle later. Create copies of these documents and store them in a secure digital location which you can access remotely, if needed (or with a trusted friend or family member).

Here are a few examples of documents you might want to access while away:

- Birth certificate
- Identification documents
- Tax forms
- · Driving record (important if you will be applying for a Canadian driver's license)
- Motor Insurance Letter (from your automobile insurer another important one if you want to drive in Canada)
- · References from previous landlords (handy for renting an apartment)
- Records of superannuation / pension contributions, if applicable

TASK 04.J

Print and download documents required for landing in Canada

Must-haves

Proof of funds

Print banking records showing that you have the CAD \$2,500 required for working holiday applicants. This could be requested when you enter Canada.

Proof of health insurance policy

Make sure you print proof of your health insurance policy (if you don't have this yet, get on it! Head over here for recommended options).

You'll likely be asked to show this proof when you meet a border agent at the Port of Entry.

Other recommended items

Immigration officers know a lot about Canada's immigration laws, but sometimes they don't know everything about the IEC program. In case the officer makes an error, it's a good idea to have printed copies of these two Government of Canada web pages to show them:

- <u>This page</u> states that your Letter of Introduction is valid for 12 months (or possibly less, if you had a medical), which should prevent an officer from terminating your work permit on the letter's expiry date (this has happened before).
- <u>This page</u> states how long an IEC work permit should be for each participating country, assuming all other conditions are met (make sure to print the portion for your country of citizenship).


